ORDER OF THE HA?WIŁ

Re: State of Emergency on Toquaht Lands Extended

Enacted under the Emergency Preparedness Act section 2.4(a)

TNO 14/2021

BACKGROUND:

- A. Because of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, on March 30, 2020, pursuant to section 2.4(a) of the Emergency Preparedness Act, the ha?wił declared a state of emergency on all Toquaht lands which was extended on April 9, 16, 23, 30, May 7, 14, 21, 28, June 4, 11, 18 25, July 2, 9, 16, 23, 30, August 6, 20, 27, September 3, 10, 17, 24, October 1, 8, 15, 22, 29, Nov 5, 12, 19, 26, December 3, 10, 17, 24, 31, 2020, January 7, 14, 21, 28, February 4, 11, 18, 25, March 4, 11, 18 and 25, 2021; and
- B. The continuing risk of an outbreak of COVID-19 among the public remains a health hazard under the Emergency Preparedness Act.

NOW THEREFORE THE HA?WIŁ ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1) Effective as of the date of this Order and pursuant to section 2.4(a) of the Emergency Preparedness Act, the ha?wił declares that a state of local emergency continues on all Toquaht lands;
- 2) The Executive's authority under section 3.4 of the Emergency Preparedness Act to implement response measures continues;
- 3) The authority of the director of operations and the director of community services to perform their duties and exercise their powers under sections 2.5 and 2.6 of the Emergency Preparedness Act, respectively, is continued;
- 4) Without limiting the directives issued in this Order, the Executive may at any time during the local state of emergency enable additional response measures in accordance with the Emergency Preparedness Act; and
- This Order expires April 8, 2021 and is subject to revision, cancellation or extension by the ha?wil in accordance with section 2.4(a) of the Emergency Preparedness Act.

FEBRUARY 10TH MEETING

ACRD OPEN & ELECTRONIC MEETINGS – COVID-19 PANDEMIC

With the extension of the Provincial Health Order on gatherings and events, the ACRD will continue to hold open Board and Committee meetings without members of the public in attendance in person until April 29, 2021. ACRD Meetings will continue to be conducted via Zoom videoconferencing and livestreamed on the ACRD website. The public have several ways to participate in ACRD open meetings. ACRD & SALVATION ARMY SIGN MOU

The Board approved entering into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Salvation Army, defining Emergency Support Service response roles they will undertake in the Alberni Valley. COVID-19 RESILIENCE INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT APPLICATIONS

The Board authorized submitting grant applications for two grants through the British Columbia – COVID-19 Resilience Infrastructure Stream (CVIRS) in the amount of \$140,000 for the extension of the Lakeshore Drive Pathway and \$32,500 for the construction of a pedestrian bridge within Evergreen Park.

WEST COAST TRAIL IN PACIFIC RIM NATIONAL PARK RESERVE REOPENING TO OVERNIGHT VISITORS IN JUNE 2021

Bamfield, BC, March 26, 2021– Parks Canada, in collaboration with the Huu-ay-aht, Pacheedaht, and Ditidaht First Nations, is pleased to announce the re-opening of the West Coast Trail for the 2021 visitor season with measures in place to protect the health of remote communities, Indigenous Guardians, visitors, and Parks Canada employees.

The 75-km West Coast Trail will be open to overnight visitors from June 4 to September 30 in 2021. Reservations will open on April 30 at 8am PDT. All three access points, including Bamfield (Pachena Trailhead), Port Renfrew (Gordon River Trailhead) and Nitinaht Village will be open.

Experienced hikers can book their adventure by visiting <u>reservation.pc.gc.ca</u> or by calling 1-877-RESERVE (1-877-737-3783). Advance reservations will be required for all hikers; no spaces will be offered on standby. At this time, the West Coast Trail is only available to Canadians.

Parks Canada and local First Nations are asking visitors to limit the risk of COVID-19 transmission by paying attention to local signs and community protocols, completing a self-assessment before travelling to the area, and following the guidelines of public health experts, including travel restrictions.

Hikers are also asked to learn in advance whether First Nations villages are welcoming visitors prior to arrival.

Huu-ay-aht's village of Anacla, adjacent to the Pachena trailhead, is currently closed to outside visitors. The Nation and the Huu-ay-aht Group of Businesses are in the process of determining when and how to safely open Pachena Bay Campground for the season and will announce details soon. Visitors are welcome to take advantage of the locally owned businesses and other services in nearby Bamfield.

Ditidaht First Nation is ready to welcome visitors to the Nitinaht area and asks that visitors show respect to community members and one another. West Coast Trail Comfort Camping at Tsuquadah, Nitinaht Motel, and the Nitinaht Visitor Centre and Store will be open. Nitinaht Windsurf Park and Caycuse Campsite will be welcoming visitors on May 21 with reservations opening on April 7 (www.nitinahtcampground.com). Reservations will be required as there will be no walk-ins permitted.

Pacheedaht First Nation is offering a range of services near the Gordon River Trailhead, including extended stay parking, river crossing transportation, oceanfront camping with hot showers and laundry, shopping at the San Juan Market, and mountaintop lodging at Soule Creek.

Reservations for Green Point Campground in the Long Beach Unit will launch on April 7. Details on overnight camping opportunities and possible reservation opportunities for the Broken Group Islands and Keeha Beach are yet to be determined as Parks Canada continues to work collaboratively with local First Nations and explore safe visitor experience options. PART 1 - INTRODUCTORY PROVISIONS

Short title

1.1 This Act may be cited as the Annual Budget Act, 2021-2022.

Executive oversight

1.2 The member of the Executive holding the finance portfolio is responsible for the executive oversight of this Act.

Definitions

1.3 Words or expressions defined in the Financial Administration Act that are also used in this Act will, except where the context requires otherwise or is otherwise indicated, have the same meaning as those words or expressions defined in the Financial Administration Act.

Adoption of annual budget

1.4 The annual budget attached as Schedule 1 is adopted for the 2021-2022 fiscal year.

Specific purpose revenue

- 1.5 (a) Subject to subsection (b), if during the 2021-2022 fiscal year the Toquaht Nation receives revenue for a specified purpose and that revenue and the associated expenses for the specified purposes are not budgeted for in Schedule 1, upon receipt of that revenue, the director of operations may, by order, amend Schedule 1 by
 - (i) adding additional revenue in an amount equal to the revenue received for the specified purpose, and
 - (ii) adding additional expenses in the amounts equal to the anticipated expenditures required to carry out the specified purposes.
 - (b) The revenue contemplated in this section may not be revenue received from a Toquaht institution or a Toquaht corporation.

Commencement

1.6 This Act comes into force on April 1st, 2021.
